Advent

The Christian Year commences with the *Advent* Season. It begins with the Sunday nearest November 30, and lasts through Christmas Eve. It's the season of preparation for the ADVENT, the coming of the Messiah, the birth of JESUS CHRIST. When we think of the greatest miracle and mystery of the ages, the Incarnation, the "WORD" becoming Flesh...God coming into the world in human form, it's plain to see that we need a time of reflection and preparation to be ready to receive our God this way. Advent provides us with four weeks to prepare our hearts for the celebration of the birth of the Christ Child. Slowly our church begins to fill with the sights, sounds and smells of Advent. Purple is the color used through the Advent Season. It has long been the color of royalty and the church uses it to call her members to prepare for the birth of the King. The music we hear and sing prepares us for Christ's birth.

We mark the season of Advent, in our own church, in many ways. The Scripture readings, sermons and musical selections begin to focus on preparing ourselves for the birth of the Christ Child. Other notable changes are the visual transformations in our sanctuary. Candles, reminding us that Christ is the light of the world, are put in all the windows. Poinsettias, the traditional flower, begin to adorn the altar and wreaths hang on our doors and in our Sanctuary. The Advent Wreath becomes a focal point for four weeks, calling us to put our lives in order.

Leader: Christians around the world wait in hopeful expectation for the advent of

Christ.

People: We live in hope for our families, our church and for our world.

Leader: Because we're a people who believe, a people who have seen, and a people

who have received the promises of Christ, even in the midst of darkness and imperfection, we live with real hope, with real peace, with real love, and with real joy in our hearts, as we remember again the greatest gift of

love given to this world, the gift of Christ.

People: We live our lives more abundantly when we live lives filled with hope,

peace, love and joy and we welcome the light of Christ into our hearts.

Advent concludes with our Christmas Eve Candlelight services. During this time, we let the Scriptures speak for themselves as we listen to the story of the birth of Jesus, sing the songs that we have known all of our lives and reconfirm our belief that Christ came into this world to shine God's love upon it. This is a glorious way to usher in the Christmas season, and we are reminded that, through the exchange of gifts, we celebrate the ultimate gift – Jesus Christ.

Christmastide

Christmastide begins with Christmas morning and continues through the eve of Epiphany, January 5. There are usually two Sundays in this season and it is strictly an observance of the birth of Jesus, the Christ. White is the color used for the antependia and stoles because it is the color of perfection, purity, joy, and holiness.

At this time of year, we are reminded of the tensions we live with every day. We want peace, but parts of our world are at war. We hope for the destruction of the powers of evil, for the righteousness and justice of God, for the dawning of God's peace over all the nations and the undoing of the machines of war. For Christians, this hope has been intensified by the coming of the Messiah, and only by experiencing these tensions and the expectations of the whole laboring together to achieve this, can our participation in the dying and rising of Christ be made real.

"Joy to the World, the Lord has Come" means that Jesus has come into our lives and that we have accepted him as our savior. Because we understand Christmas this way, our worship services here at Southport Congregational Church are capable of addressing the deepest places of our human need and then celebrate our most profound experiences.

Epiphany

The season of Epiphany begins on January 6th and lasts until the third Sunday before Lent. Epiphany Sunday marks the coming of the wise men to represent the races of humanity. The season of Epiphany is the time of the Christian year that we emphasize missionary work because when the wise men found Christ, it was the first appearance of Jesus to the Gentiles, or non-Jews. And as the wise men returned to their own countries and told everyone about the Messiah whom they had found, they began the missionary work of spreading the Good News to the world.

"After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, 'Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him.' When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh."

Pre-Lent

The Sundays following Epiphany and preceding Lent, we look to the earthly life of Jesus. We see him as a young boy teaching in the Temple. We see him as a powerful preacher bringing God's word into the world. We see him as a healer and miracle worker, who restores people to health. We see him as a teacher with profound wisdom, and we see him as our Savior.

Lent Julianne Center

At the heart of the Christian faith is our sharing in the life, suffering, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ – all which occurs during the season of *Lent*. We proclaim that "the word became flesh and dwelt among us." (*John 1:14*) Jesus Christ was born into human history in the fullness of time for our salvation.

In our world, he lived and taught, suffered and was put to death; but God "raised him from the dead and made him sit at the right hand...and God has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills in all."

Through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we are delivered from sin and death, and by the Holy Spirit we are born into eternal life with God. This is what we confess and this is what we continually renew in our worship during Lent. Since the beginning of Christian Worship, these events have given shape and meaning to the week, the whole year, and even to each day of the Christian Community's life. Purple is the color used during Lent; the color which calls us to self-exploration and preparation.

Ash Wednesday developed as a day of penitence to mark the beginning of Lent – the forty days of preparation for the celebration of Easter. Ash Wednesday is a particular time for new beginnings in the faith, a time for returning to prayer and meditation. This is also a time when we put away our transgressions and failures of the past, in light of who we are yet to become by the grace of God, in the future. Lent continues from Ash Wednesday for forty days, not including Sundays.

Lent is observed in commemoration of the forty days fast of Jesus; a season of penitence as we remember the suffering of Christ and the price he paid for our redemption. It is also considered the revival season of the Church, as Christians seek, through worship, prayer, music, education and mission, to reach a higher plane of spiritual living and to renew their commitment to the fellowship of Christ's Church.

The final week of the Lenten Season, called *Holy Week*, is filled with symbolic days and Christian worship events. Holy Week begins with *Palm Sunday*. This is the Sunday before Easter and it is the day that we remember Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, when the crowd waved palm branches and sang "Hosanna to the King!" We give out palms on this Sunday as symbolic reminders that Christ made that journey for us.

Lent Continued

The Thursday evening before Easter is called *Maundy Thursday*. The title derives from the Latin word "mandatum novum" which means "a new commandment," because on this night Jesus gives the commandments of "drink this cup and break this bread, in remembrance of me." The Board of Deacons provide a very moving and dramatic worship service this evening, which includes a traditional Seder meal – the Jewish ceremonial meal eaten during Passover and at which Jesus had his Last Supper. We move from celebrating our Jewish heritage to the spiritual base of our faith. The Deacons reenact the moving and powerful events of the Last Supper through a candle-light service where Jesus' last words to his Disciples are shared. In this service, we relive, with the disciples, that meal in which Jesus spoke the unforgettable words with the breaking of the bread and the sharing of the cup – "This is my body," "This is my blood of the new covenant" – and command that we forever "Do this in remembrance of me." We experience anew that which was enacted on this extraordinary evening, and during the service of Tenebrae (shadows), we recall the growing darkness of the next hours' events: betrayal in the garden, arrest, the condemnation of the trial and the crucifixion.

On *Good Friday* we recall the crucifixion and death of Christ. The name "Good Friday" is a variation on the name "God's Friday," where the word "good" was used to replace the word "God," which was often viewed as too holy for the average person to say. On this day, in our church, we hold a prayer vigil from noon until 6 p.m., when members of our congregation come and meditate in the Chapel and pray for our church, our community and our world. Our Chapel is bare except for the cross, draped in a black cloth. It's on this day, that the reality of Jesus' death is met and our own shortcomings are encountered. We keep watch and pray as we move through the time of burial and rest in the tomb.

"In the sixth hour darkness came over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?'—which means, 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' With a loud cry, Jesus breathed his last. The curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. And when the centurion, who stood there in front of Jesus, heard his cry and saw how he died, he said, 'Surely this man was the Son of God!'"

It's interesting to note that, according to the ancient historian, Tertullian, this was a "cosmic" or "world event." Phlegon, a Greek author from Caria, writing a chronology soon after 137 AD, reported that in the fourth year of the 202^{nd} Olympiad (i.e. 33 AD) there was "the greatest eclipse of the sun" and that it became night in the sixth hour of the day [i.e. noon] (identical to Gospels claim of darkness during the sixth hour) so that stars even appeared in the heavens. There was a great earthquake in Bithynia, and many things were overturned in Nicaea." Jesus is believed to have died in the ninth hour – or three o'clock in the afternoon. In approaching the worship services of Holy Week, we should think of each event not as an independent entity but rather as a continually unfolding unified drama of our salvation, leading up to Easter Sunday.

Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and on the third day rise.' And they remembered Jesus' words, and returning from the tomb they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest."

Easter

Easter Sunday begins with our Beach service at 8 a.m. at Sasco Hill Beach, led by our Confirmation Class and then with our Church Service at 10 a.m. Our songs rise to the heavens as we share this special time of celebration when we recall the words of Saint Paul, "For this perishable nature must put on the imperishable, and this mortal nature must put on immortality. When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written: 'Death is swallowed up in victory.' 'O death, where is thy victory? O death, where is thy sting?' The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

On Easter morning we are overwhelmed by God's victory and by the enormity of God's mercy and love. We proclaim Christ crucified, dead and buried, risen and exalted as the head of the church – the Savior of humanity and the Lord of all! The faith of the whole church now comes into focus in the continuing life and communion with Christ. Our faith lives in expectant hope of the Kingdom of God. Whatever life we have is a reflection of the life of God made visible in Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit.

SCRIPTURE READING: *Matthew* 28:1-10

"After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb. There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow. The guards were so afraid of him that they shook and became like dead men.

The angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.'"

Eastertide

The joy of the message of Easter permeates the entire period from Easter morning through Pentecost. This is known as the "Great Fifty Days." While Easter is the Sunday of all Sundays, the glory of the resurrection runs through the days and weeks of Eastertide as a never-ending celebration. We read scriptures about the disciples witnessing the experience of the Risen Lord. While the period of Lent was somber, reflective, and watchful, Eastertide is exuberant and full of "Alleluias" and "Glorias". This is also the time in which we celebrate Confirmation Sunday, when our ninth-grade students declare their faith to our church family and are welcomed in as adult members of the Church of Jesus Christ. Because Confirmation is the affirmation of the child's

Baptismal vows, it is historically appropriate for the Church to perform many Baptisms during Eastertide. The sacrament of baptism is a sign and seal of the covenant of grace, of union with Christ and his resurrection, and our calling to be with God for all of time. It declares that the children of Christian parents belong, with us who believe, to the membership of Christ's Church, and that Christ claims them as his own.

Ascensiontide

On the fortieth day of Eastertide, we celebrate *Ascensiontide*, which marks the Ascension of our resurrected Lord to heaven, where he is crowned with honor and glory and acknowledged King of Kings and Lord of Lords. The season of Ascensiontide begins 40 days after Easter on a Thursday and lasts for ten days. It's a time to remember that God fulfilled the promise that the disciples would be gifted with the power of the Holy Spirit, allowing them to go out into the world and spread the Good News of Jesus Christ.

"And Jesus led them out as far as to Bethany, and he lifted up his hands and blessed them. And it came to pass, while he blessed them, he was parted from them, and carried into heaven. And they worshipped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and were continually in the temple praising and blessing God."

Pentecost Julianne Center

In the Old Testament, the "Feast of Pentecost" was 50 days after Passover. The Christian Church adopted this term when, on the Feast of Pentecost," the disciples and apostles of Jesus were in an upper room waiting to be "clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:49). When the promised Holy Spirit descended upon them, they were all filled and began to speak the word of God. Many spoke in tongues, prophesied and later performed healings, and the Holy Spirit gave them the power to witness to their faith in Jesus Christ in such an effective manner, that thousands of people accepted Christ as their Lord and Savior. This meant that the church which had always existed in the mind of God, was now a visible reality on earth. And so, we tend to think of this day as the "birthday of the Church." Red is the color used for Pentecost as the symbol of the Holy Spirit and of the fervor given to the church through the power of God.

SCRIPTURE READING: Acts 2:1-4

"And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, the disciples were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing, mighty wind, and it filled all the entire house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit."

Trinity Sunday marks the beginning of the second half of the Christian year. During the first half of the year, there has been a focus on the growing understanding of God as Creator, then as Son, in the person of Jesus Christ, then as Holy Spirit. Now the revelation of the Trinity is complete and we worship God as the Triune God. The season of Trinity lasts until the end of the Christian Year – the day before Advent. The color is green, which speaks to us of nature, growth and life. It's the longest season of the Christian Year and the focus is on how God works in our lives. This is a time of instruction, training and practice in Christian Discipleship and missionary work.

During this time, our church celebrates the priesthood of all believers with Laity Sunday, our church's focus on helping our neighbors through Mission Sunday, and our celebration and understanding of the importance of passing on our Christian Heritage to our children through the celebratory Church School and Welcome Sundays.

And now, we have come to the end of our service. We have shared in the events from Advent to Easter Sunday. All year long, we share in a spiritual journey, as we kneel at the manger, listen on a hillside, walk the streets of Jerusalem, hear the roar of the mob, stand beneath the cross, and witness the resurrection! Let the glory of our Christian Year fill us with thanksgiving, with grace, with hope, with peace and with love as we go into the world, sharing God's love with one another and living out Christ's commandment to "Love the Lord your God, with all your heart and all your mind and all your soul and to love your neighbor as yourself." Amen.
